UNIVERSITY HIGH SCHOOL CIVILITY POLICY

The University High School Governing Board recognizes the impact that civility has on the effective operation of the school, including its role in creating a safe and positive school climate and enabling a focus on student well-being, learning, and achievement. The Board believes that each person should be treated with dignity and respect in their interactions within the school community.

The Board understands that the First Amendment provides strong protection for speech. However, the Board expects that all speech and expression will comport with norms of civil behavior on School grounds, in School facilities, during School-activities or events, and in the use of School electronic/digital systems and platforms.

Civil behavior includes, but is not limited to, behavior which is polite, courteous, reasonable, and respectful to others, and where integrity, honesty, acceptance, timeliness, dependability, observance of laws and rules, and effective communication are exhibited.

The Board and School staff shall model civil behavior as an example of behavior that is expected throughout the School. Practices that promote civil behavior include, but are not limited to, actively listening, giving full attention to the speaker, and refraining from interruptions; welcoming and encouraging participation, input, and feedback through stakeholder engagement; promptly responding to concerns; and embracing seeking understanding and empathizing with varying and diverse viewpoints. All parties should consider that UHS teachers and staff have best intentions for students, and ask clarifying questions before drawing conclusions. These practices, as appropriate, are expected with and are hereby incorporated into all governance standards adopted by the Board or Superintendent and/or professional standards or codes of conduct for employees as specified in UHS policies and regulations.

The Superintendent or designee may educate students, staff, parents/guardians, and community members in the recognition, development and demonstration of civil behavior through the incorporation of related concepts in the curriculum, the provision of staff development, and/or communication of this policy.

Students, staff, parents/guardians, and community members shall not communicate or behave in a manner that causes disruption; hinders the orderly conduct of School operations, the educational program, or any other School program or activity; or creates an unsafe learning or working environment. The Superintendent or designee may respond to perceived disruptive, violent, or threatening behavior in accordance with law and Ed Code 32211.

Behavior by students or staff that is discriminatory, harassing, or intimidating, including sexual harassment, bullying, and/or hate violence, or behavior that is in any other way unlawful, is prohibited and is subject to discipline in accordance with law and School policy and regulations.
